

The Privilege Pass

Gold	Only required to be in timetabled lessons, Wednesday (assembly) and Tuesday (Window to the World) Tutor sessions. Allowed to leave site at break and lunch
Silver	Required to be in timetabled lessons, period 3 & 4 registered study, Wednesday (assembly) and Tuesday (Window to the World) Tutor sessions. Allowed to leave site at break and lunch
Bronze	Required to be in for every Tutor Session (Mon-Thurs) periods 1-4 but can leave at lunch if no lesson period 5. Allowed to leave site at both break and lunch.

- Registered Study Periods 1 and 2 is reserved for <u>silent</u> study. NO PHONES!
 - Miss Perryman takes register
 - If they don't attend, we will follow up and there will be sanctions
- Group collaboration Period 3 & 4. This will be where students can work in smaller groups discussing work, yet still maintain a working environment volume. PHONES ALLOWED!
- Period 5- If you have no lessons you can leave at lunch (excluding Wednesdays)





Privilege Pass: How to improve

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- Privilege Passes are reviewed at each assessment point. There are 4 AP (assessment points) over the school year.
- Dependent on a student's attitude to learning, their homework, classwork and assessment results in lessons. Data is received from staff who grade each of these areas between 1 (outstanding) down to 4 (below expectations)
- AP1 (December)





Assessments and organisation

The Sixth Form Team have reflected on how best to support students. The following refinements are designed to improve student's academic performance and overall organisational effectiveness.

- Subject assessments every three weeks Teachers decide what this assessment looks like for their subject. The results of this are shared with the P16 team. This allows us to respond quicker to student's needs.
- **Folder checks in Tutor Time** Tutors check on each students' organisation of files, classwork and homework. If the student is struggling to stay organised then resources and advice is offered and the student is asked to re-present their folders/documents at a later date.

Narrate/Reminder/Warning/Sanction

What do we give sanctions for?

- Homework (have one opportunity to hand in the next day)
- Being late and NOT communicating it
- Truancy
- Misbehaviour in study and lessons
- 3 absences/punctuality issues over a fortnight

What are the sanctions?

- 30 minutes in Sixth Form study area with Miss Loj
- Missed detention? 60 minute detention in Sixth Form area with Miss Loj
- Missed escalated detention: Student report and parent meeting





What do we need from our students?

- To fully apply yourself in your subjects, working beyond the set classwork in order to make the best use of registered study. Staff are sharing additional work with students specifically for registered study



The competition is high and students need to separate themselves from the rest - this can be done by:


- Planning next steps early
